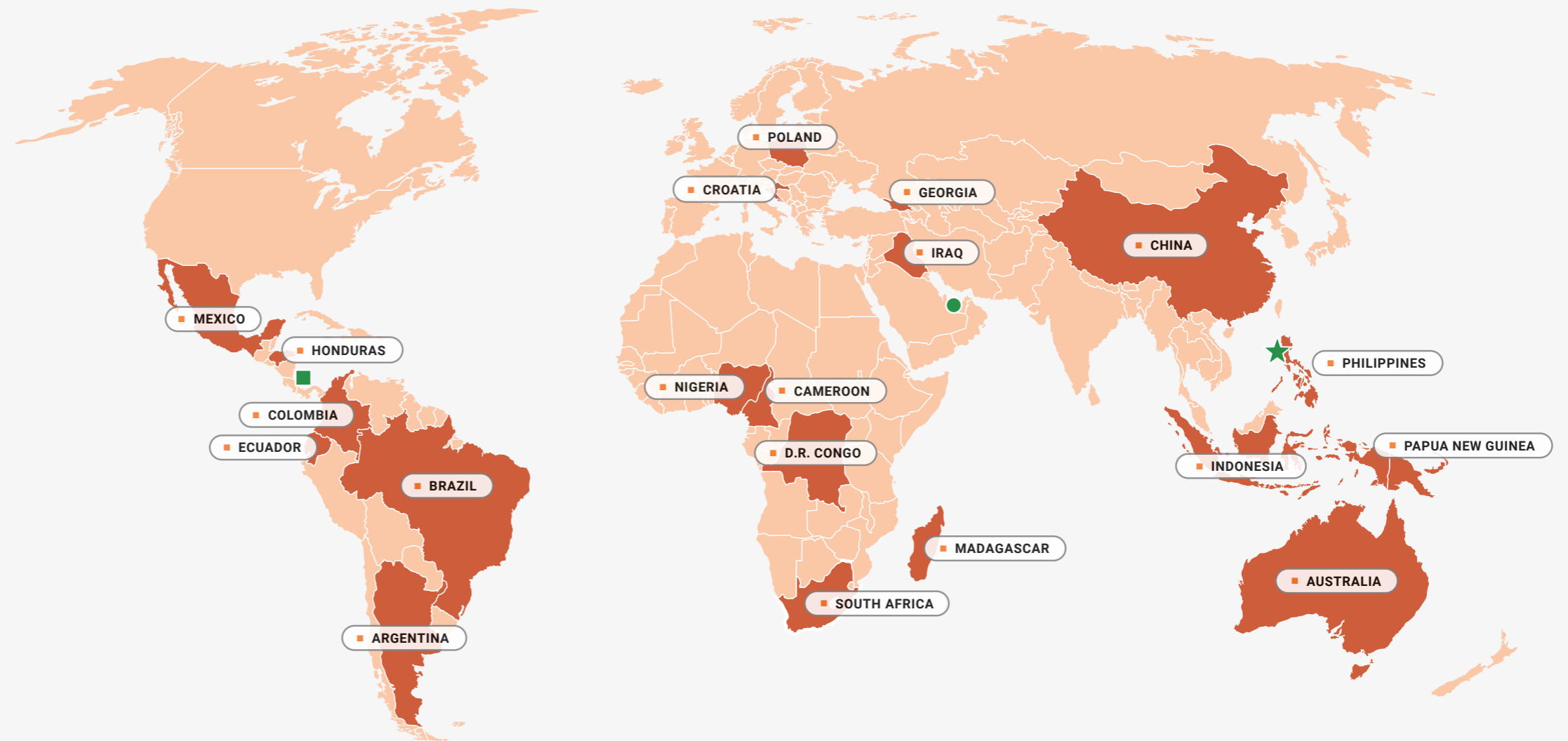

Introduction

International Container Terminal Services Inc. is a global port developer and terminal operator that integrates social responsibility into its operations, working closely with its host communities and the countries where it operates. ICTSI collaborates with local governments, organizations, and community groups to support programs in education, environmental management, and community development.

ICTSI's strong performance in 2025, together with consistent gains in recent years, strengthened its capacity to support development efforts in its host locations. Communities continue to face challenges in learning, nutrition, safety, and environmental stability. Development institutions highlight the value of cooperation among public, private, and civic partners in addressing these concerns. ICTSI contributes by supporting programs formed with local partners and aligned with needs identified on the ground.

ICTSI established the ICTSI Foundation in 2009 to organize and expand its community programs. The Foundation leads projects in the Philippines and works with ICTSI business units overseas to help guide their social work. It uses the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals as a reference for programs focused on youth development, environmental protection, and community assistance.

Through this approach, the Company channels its growth into programs that aim to provide lasting value to its host communities and countries. ICTSI intends to continue this work as part of its commitment to responsible and inclusive development.





Corporate Social Responsibility in ICTSI

Corporate social responsibility guides how ICTSI works with its stakeholders. The Company supports responsible practices across its operations and values partnerships that strengthen its connection with communities.

Within ICTSI, good governance is practiced through accountability, transparency, and responsible resource management. The Company supports employee development, occupational safety, and environmental responsibility.

Beyond its terminals, ICTSI contributes to community work shaped by identified needs. Programs support young people, encourage environmental stewardship, and provide community assistance. These principles guide the work of ICTSI business units, the ICTSI Foundation, and partner organizations.

The Foundation plans and implements programs in youth development, environmental protection, and community assistance, using the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals as a reference.

Youth development programs provide scholarships, school support, and learning opportunities for students, including young athletes. Environmental efforts include tree growing, conservation activities, and awareness programs. Community welfare supports needs related to health, nutrition, safety, and emergency response.

The Foundation works with local governments, schools, civic groups, and development institutions to ensure programs remain practical and responsive to local conditions. Through these efforts, ICTSI helps strengthen community resilience and build long-term partnerships.

ICTSI Foundation in 2025

In 2025, the ICTSI Foundation worked with schools, local governments, and community groups to support students, protect the environment, and help families in ICTSI's host communities and countries. Youth programs expanded learning and development opportunities for students, including young athletes.

Environmental projects focused on tree growing and mangrove rehabilitation, while community assistance addressed food, health, and emergency needs. The summary below highlights the reach of these programs throughout the year.

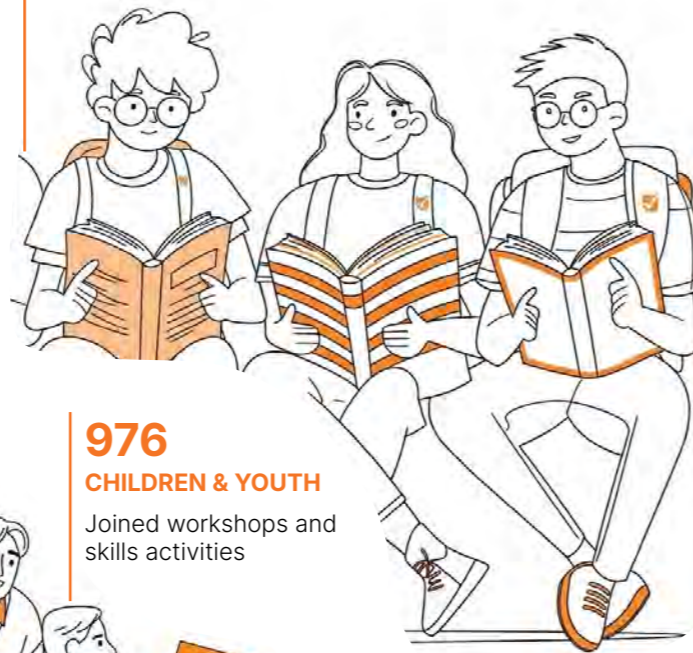

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

The ICTSI Foundation delivered a range of education and youth-focused programs in 2025, working with schools, local governments, and partner institutions to support learning, strengthen school systems, and expand opportunities for students, including young athletes. The following sections detail the Foundation's work under the youth development pillar.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM



Beneficiaries:

- 1,153 scholars
- 220 academic scholars
- 319 JEMST scholars
- 614 TechVoc scholars

The Foundation supported 1,153 scholars in 2025 through academic, educational assistance, and technical-vocational scholarship programs.

Academic support continued for 220 high school and college scholars across ICTSI's areas of operation in the Philippines. Of these, 50 scholars graduated during the year, including 24 honor awardees and 11 graduates who passed professional board examinations.

Under the JEMST Educational Assistance Program, which supports the student-dependents of ICTSI's outsourced janitorial staff, eco-patrols, meal servers, security personnel, and daycare teachers, the Foundation provided monthly educational stipends to 319 students. The assistance enabled beneficiaries to continue their schooling and advance to the next academic level. Since its launch in school year 2023–2024, the program has supported more than 900 student-dependents.

The Foundation also sustained its technical-vocational scholarship program at Don Bosco Youth Center–Tondo, providing full tuition support to 614 students enrolled in various technical courses. These scholars are expected to complete their training in the second and third quarters of 2026. Since 2021, the program has supported 2,300 learners, combining technical skills training with personal formation to improve employability and long-term livelihood prospects.

LITERACY PROGRAM



Beneficiaries:
 ■ 245 Kinder to Grade 3 public school students

In partnership with the BINHI English Literacy Foundation, the Foundation supported literacy interventions for 245 Kinder to Grade 3 learners from Rosauro Almario, Herminigildo J. Atienza, and P. Guevarra Elementary Schools. The program strengthened foundational reading skills through evidence-based remedial sessions and teacher training.

The partnership began in 2022 and provides annual support to struggling early-grade readers. Since its launch, the program has delivered literacy interventions to nearly 500 non-readers and struggling readers.



EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE

The Foundation supported 15,239 students and 561 teachers across 23 public schools through the provision of digital learning tools, classroom equipment, and school support aligned with the Department of Education's Digital Rise and Computerization Programs. A total of 58 public schools received smart TVs, printers, and computer laboratory equipment.

In Tagoloan, Misamis Oriental, the Foundation and Mindanao Container Terminal completed the classroom digitalization project, equipping all public school classrooms in the municipality with smart TVs through donations made over several years. Schools also received tools and equipment to improve disaster preparedness.

MY READING NOOK PROJECT



Beneficiaries:

Three public elementary schools were enhanced through renovated facilities and the establishment of dedicated reading spaces. Majada Out Elementary School in Calamba, Sta. Cruz Elementary School in Misamis Oriental, and Balite Elementary School in General Santos City were equipped with reading nooks designed to support literacy and encourage independent reading. A total of **3,503 students** benefited from the project.



ALTERNATIVE LEARNING SYSTEM SUPPORT

Alternative Learning System (ALS) students and teachers from F. SPORTS ASSISTANCE



Beneficiaries:

- 1,000 athletes and coaches
- 50 national team members
- 700 student athletes

Through partnership with the Philippine Athletics Track and Field Association (PATAFA), 1,000 professional and aspiring athletes and coaches were supported in both national and international athletic events.

IF's support enabled PATAFA to send 50 national team members in the Southeast Asian and Olympic Games and garnered a 31-medal haul in the 33rd Southeast Asian Games.

At the grassroots level, IF distributed hygiene kits to 700 Palarong Pambansa participants from Region XII, boosting players' performance and overall well-being. These initiatives strengthened Filipino youth's sports participation, promoted health and preparedness, and underscored IF's role in empowering athletes across all levels of competition.





TRAINING AND CAPACITY-BUILDING



Beneficiaries:

- 100 teachers from DepEd Schools Division of Olongapo City
- 84 high school and college scholars
- 80 children in need of social protection
- 55 children in conflict with the law

A total of 215 young individuals and 100 teachers were equipped with vital knowledge and skills through a series of capacity-building initiatives.

These included training on mental health awareness and coping strategies, a three-day leadership workshop, and sessions on adolescent changes and behavior.

Together, these efforts strengthened protective factors for young people, empowered educators to guide their students more effectively, and fostered resilient communities prepared to address challenges both inside and outside the classroom.



SOCIAL PROTECTION

ICTSI Foundation sustained its partnerships with key institutions delivering protective and rehabilitative services to victims of human trafficking and all forms of abuse.

Partnership with Child Protection Network enabled delivery of medical, legal, social and mental health services to 940 clients and trained 3,727 professionals in providing multidisciplinary services in Child Protection Units nationwide.

IF also continued support to Voice of the Free (VoF) in providing comprehensive care including shelter, medical, psychosocial support, education, and legal services to survivors of human trafficking and sexual exploitation.

IF and VoF also continued the i-FIGHT movement in 2025, empowering 1,622 high school students from 5 public schools in Manila and Iloilo City. The anti-human trafficking campaign sought to raise awareness of syndicate's strategies in luring victims as well as reporting mechanisms for suspected cases of human trafficking.



NUTRITION SUPPORT PROGRAM



Beneficiaries:

- 2,429 daycare and public elementary school students in RAES Annexes in Parola and Isla Puting Bato

IF reinforced its commitment to fighting hunger and malnutrition at the foundational level by integrating feeding support into early childhood and elementary education for the third consecutive year.

A total of 2,429 enrolled students across 11 daycares and 2 Rosaura Almario Elementary School Annexes benefited from daily feeding support, ensuring consistent access to nutritious meals for the entire school year.

School bags and reusable tumblers were also provided to each beneficiary as additional support. This initiative not only addressed hunger and immediate nutritional needs but also contributed to improved concentration, classroom participation, and overall learning outcomes of young learners.



ENVIRONMENT PROTECTION

TREE GROWING PROGRAMS



Reinforcing its commitment to protect biodiversity by saving our forests, the ICTSI Foundation expanded its tree growing programs in partnership with the Ramon Aboitiz Foundation.

The One to Tree program that started in 2022 successfully planted and maintained 45,150 timber and fruit-bearing trees across 90 hectares of land in Balayan and Tuy, Batangas. In 2025, the maintenance of these trees were formally turned over to 227 farmers whose land were under the Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program managed by CARDD.

IF and RAFI also launched the Mangrove Forest Enrichment Project in 2025 which seeks to plant and maintain 25,000 mangroves in Lian and San Luis, Batangas over the three year period. IF and RAFI kickstarted the project's first phase with the planting of 12,500 mangroves in Lian.





BIODIVERSITY CONSERVATION WITH KATALA FOUNDATION, INC.

IF's continuing partnership with Katala Foundation, Inc., sustained biodiversity conservation efforts in the Victoria-Anepa'an Mountain Range — camera traps installed recorded 41 species; advocacy campaigns to protect endemic and endangered species reached 14,971 individuals; 186 illegal activities were reported; and 8 scientific papers were presented locally and abroad.



COASTAL CLEAN-UP

IF supported a coastal clean-up initiative led by the Manila Department of Environment and Public Services, reinforcing collective action for healthier marine ecosystems.



PAROLA ECO PATROLS PROJECT

- 80,000 residents of Barangay 20 & 275

The year 2025 marked the 12th year of Parola EcoPatrols Project, continuing mobilization of community residents in Parola and Isla Puting Bato, Manila to strengthen household waste management practices.

Daily efforts of 78 active EcoPatrols resulted in organized garbage collection complemented by monthly solid waste management campaigns in Barangays 20 and 275.

In 2025, Parola EcoPatrol volunteers also participated in a Waste Analysis and Characterization Study (WACS) to gather data on the type, volume, and composition of waste in Parola and help the local government of Manila generate to plan for better solid waste management.

These initiatives directly benefited an estimated 80,000 residents, fostering cleaner surroundings and greater community participation in environmental stewardship.

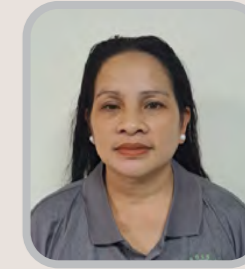

COMMUNITY WELFARE

INSTITUTIONAL OUTREACH ACTIVITIES



Beneficiaries:

- 370 vulnerable individuals

The ICTSI Foundation, in partnership with ICTSI business units, demonstrated commitment to uplifting vulnerable populations. Through a series of institutional outreach activities, the ICTSI group promoted the spirit of volunteerism among employees and ensured holistic support for children, youth, and the elderly.

IF and Global Procurement supported the continued provision of essential care and services for 44 abandoned and neglected elderly at the Little Sisters of the Poor through donation of grocery packages.

Collaboration with Global Corporate Legal Affairs provided 36 children housed at Voice of the Free's Center of Hope with meals, self-care packages, and delivery of an intervention aimed at strengthening spiritual health and well-being.

Through Hands on Manila's Servathon 2025, IF extended assistance to 90 beneficiaries from partner communities in Dalig and San Vicente, Rizal, and childcare institutions such as CRIBS, Asilo de San Vicente de Paul, and Haven for Children, with the help of ICTSI and MICT volunteers.

In celebration of International Mandela Day, IF partnered with the South African Embassy to provide 200 children in conflict with the law under Nasyon ng Kabataan with hygiene kits, snacks, and hosted a day filled with fun activities.



"HANDOG SALU-SALO AT REGALO SA PASKO"



Beneficiaries:
 ■ 3,077 vulnerable individuals

Through the annual "Handog Salu-Salo at Regalo sa Pasko" project, IF and ICTSI's local subsidiaries spread holiday cheer across the company's areas of business operation.

In Manila, more than 2,100 individuals — including indigent children, hospital patients, contractual workers, persons deprived of liberty, and poor families—received meals, groceries, and gifts, and were treated to Christmas parties.

The project also extended to 200 tricycle drivers and operators in Calamba; 175 relocated families and senior citizens in Bauan; 120 children with special needs, CICL, and children in need of special protection in Iloilo; and 240 daycare students and their families in Misamis Oriental.

In Subic, IF and SBITC organized the first PaskOlympics 2025: Palarong Pinoy sa Kabataan, a sportsfest that celebrated traditional Filipino games and offered meaningful recreational activities for vulnerable children. The sportsfest gathered 242 children from Subic-based institutions that support victims of abuse, neglect, and abandonment, as well as learners from indigenous communities. The event is also in line with the celebration of the National Children's Month.

The simultaneous Christmas outreach activities brought communities together in the spirit of Christmas, spreading joy, compassion, and solidarity to those most in need.





MEDICAL MISSIONS AND HEALTH ASSISTANCE

- 1,913 indigent residents from ICTSI's local host communities

IF extended vital health services to underserved communities through medical missions and hospital and local health center support.

IF donated medical equipment to Gat Andres Bonifacio Medical Center strengthening its capacity to serve patients from Tondo and neighboring communities.

In Subic and Olongapo, 336 indigenous Aeta residents received medical care and free medicines and supplements. Similar initiatives supported the primary health care needs of 300 indigent residents of Barangay San Roque, Bauan, Batangas, 300 residents of Brgy. Ingore in Iloilo City, 377 residents of Brgy. Sta. Ana in Tagoloan, Misamis Oriental, and 600 residents of Brgy. Lunen in Tupi, South Cotabato.

Through these initiatives, IF demonstrated its commitment to improving access to healthcare, addressing urgent medical needs, and promoting the well-being of vulnerable populations.

RELIEF OPERATIONS

IF extended immediate aid to families affected by disasters and emergencies within and beyond ICTSI's host communities.

Immediate support was provided to 3,356 families affected by fire outbreaks in Isla Puting Bato, Aroma, and Happy Land in Tondo, Manila.

IF also provided relief assistance to 3,500 families across the municipalities of Lian, San Pascual, San Luis, Bauan, Mabini, Tingloy, and Lobo in Batangas, as well as 100 families in Tanza, Cavite who were affected by Typhoon Crising.

MICT-SDU YOUTH DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES



ICTSI, through the MICT-Sustainability and Development Unit (MICT-SDU), supported several youth-focused initiatives in Parola in 2025 aimed at improving access to education, strengthening leadership skills, and promoting child safety and well-being.

Through the Balik Eskwela Program, 200 senior high school students received school supply kits at the start of the academic year, helping reduce financial barriers for low-income families and supporting continued school attendance.

MICT-SDU also partnered with Puso sa Puso Edukasyon, Inc. (PSPEI) to support 30 learners under the Alternative Learning System (ALS) program. Assistance included daily meal support, printed learning modules, mentoring, and micro-certification courses in practical skills such as cooking and digital literacy. Complementary activities—including career orientation, mock interviews, and leadership training—further strengthened learners' confidence, employability, and leadership capabilities. The year concluded with recognition and graduation ceremonies celebrating the academic achievements of ALS learners.

To promote child safety and awareness, the Road Safety Program was implemented which enhanced learning modules and distributed interactive road safety kits to 1,000 children.



SDU also supported the Children's Month Celebration, which gathered 200 daycare pupils from 12 Parola centers for a community event highlighting children's rights, creativity, and cultural expression through performances and a street dance competition. MICT-SDU also strengthened its partnership with academic institutions by hosting and supervising social work interns from Centro Escolar University (CEU) and Philippine Christian University (PCU) as part of their

field instruction programs in the Parola community. Under the supervision of SDU's licensed social worker, interns were guided in conducting community-based research, stakeholder engagement, and development planning activities in Barangays 20 and 275. The internship program provided students with practical exposure to community development work while contributing to ongoing initiatives in Parola.

Through these initiatives, ICTSI continued to invest in education, youth empowerment, and child protection, strengthening opportunities for young people in the Parola community.



CRG NAMED SPORTS GODFATHER OF THE YEAR



ICTSI Executive Vice President and Global Corporate Head Christian R. Gonzalez was named Godfather of the Year by the Philippine Sports Commission-Philippine Paralympic Committee-Philippine Olympic Committee (PSC-PPC-POC) Media Group during the 5th Siklab Youth Sports Awards on October 11 at the Diamond Hotel Manila.

The PSC-PPC-POC Media Group, composed of sports journalists, recognized Mr. Gonzalez for advancing youth sports through the ICTSI Foundation's sports initiatives.

As ICTSI Foundation president, Mr. Gonzalez has helped expand the company's partnership with the Philippine Athletics Track and Field Association (PATAFA), providing support for athletes including pole vaulter EJ Obiena and sponsoring grassroots events like the ICTSI Philippine Athletics Championships.



ICTSI CHAMPIONS GRASSROOTS SPORTS IN 65TH PALARONG PAMBANSA



ICTSI served as co-presenter for the 65th Palarong Pambansa (National Games), held from May 25 to 30 in Laoag, Ilocos Norte.

The annual event brought together over 15,000 student-athletes from 20 athletic associations, representing 18 regions, as well as the National Academy of Sports and the Philippine Schools Overseas. Athletes competed across 34 sporting events.

ICTSI's involvement highlights its commitment to supporting grassroots sports and encouraging the development of young athletes in the Philippines.

VICT STRENGTHENS PARTNERSHIPS WITH LEADING UNIVERSITIES



VICT continues to strengthen its partnerships with top Victorian universities, including Swinburne University of Technology, RMIT University, and the University of Melbourne, to inspire future logistics professionals and advance innovation in terminal operations.

These collaborations focus on two main areas: encouraging students to pursue careers in the logistics

industry and working with academics on technical and operational projects to improve safety and efficiency.

As part of this engagement, VICT regularly hosts terminal visits for teachers and students, offering them firsthand exposure to the innovative and sustainable technologies that power modern port operations.

CONTECON MANZANILLO STRENGTHENS COMMITMENT TO EDUCATION WITH 8TH RACE WITH A CAUSE



Contecon Manzanillo (CMSA) successfully held the eighth edition of the Carrera con Causa (Race with a Cause) Contecon, an annual event that benefits education, sports and tourism in Manzanillo. This year's edition brought together more than 4,000 runners and a large audience that gathered early at the FONDEPORT Industrial Park.

The race featured several categories—3K, 5.5K and 10K, as well as children's races and a family walk—designed to include people of all ages and fitness levels. With a prize pool of MXN 316,000, the event attracted participants from different states across the country, boosting sports tourism in the region.

Among the highlights of this year's race was the special course inside the terminal, making it the first race in Mexico to allow participants to enter an operational maritime terminal. Runners experienced the unique opportunity of running beneath the largest quay cranes in the Americas.



Among the initiatives discussed was the delivery of infrastructure improvements and equipment to 13 public schools, including remodeling, construction, maintenance, and the provision of essential school supplies. These projects were funded through proceeds from the 7th edition of Contecon's Race for a Cause.

CMSA also donated backpacks to the top-performing sixth-grade students from each participating school to support their transition to the next stage of their education. In addition, the company awarded 40 scholarships to students recognized for academic excellence through the State Children's Knowledge Olympiad, helping reduce financial barriers to continued learning.

NORTHPORT, PARTNERS COLLAB FOR COASTAL CLEANUP



NorthPort and several partners conducted a simultaneous clean-up activity on September 20 in celebration of International Coastal Clean-up Day and National Maritime Week. Their combined efforts resulted in the collection of 6.4 tons of waste from the coastline.

The activity gathered 130 volunteers from various organizations, including the Porters Association, Herstal Security, Philippine Ports Authority-Port Planning Division, Container Bridge Philippines, Inc., Prime Metro BMD Corporation, SMEC, Primepower

PMS Network Inc., Iprudential, and several NorthPort departments such as NPIOU, WWU, HRAD, Engineering, IT, and Operations.

The initiative highlights the collective role of organizations and communities in the rehabilitation of Manila Bay and in the protection of marine ecosystems.



MMT SUPPORTS #SEATHECHANGE INITIATIVE



Manila Multipurpose Terminal (MMT) marked the 2025 International Coastal Cleanup (ICC) and National Maritime Week with a collective show of care for the environment. In October, employees volunteered to

step away from their desks and daily routines to join a coastal cleanup with the global theme Turning the Tide on Ocean Trash and #SeaTheChange.

Teams from Human Resources, Commercial, Finance – General Services, Health, Safety, and Environment, Engineering, MHCPSI-NAFLU, and Corporate Affairs worked side by side along the shoreline, gathering everything from plastic bottles to assorted debris. By the end of the cleanup, the group had collected roughly 500 kilograms of waste.

MIT EXPANDS MANGROVE PLANTING INITIATIVE TO TATANA COMMUNITY



Motukea International Terminal (MIT) has expanded its mangrove planting program beyond the port area through a partnership with TotalEnergies Papua LNG and Tatana village, with the group successfully planting 105 mangrove seedlings in November 2025.

The program is part of MIT's initiatives for sustainability, coastal protection, and carbon emission reduction through nature-based solutions. By extending the program to the community, MIT and its partners are restoring marine ecosystems and supporting long-term climate mitigation efforts.

Volunteers from Tatana participated in the planting and awareness seminars, highlighting the shared responsibility in managing local coastal environments.



MIT SPEARHEADS MANGROVE CONSERVATION AT FAIRFAX HARBOUR



Motukea International Terminal (MIT), in partnership with PNG Ports Corporation and TotalEnergies EP PNG Ltd., completed the second phase of a mangrove rehabilitation project with the planting of 500 mangrove seedlings at Fairfax Harbour in Port Moresby.

Volunteers worked to complete project after the Motukea Mangrove Conservation and Rehabilitation Project signage was unveiled. The project, carried out under the tri-party Memorandum of Understanding signed in May 2024, highlights the group's commitment to mitigate climate change and strengthen coastal protection. With more than 1,000 seedlings now planted across two phases, the project contributes to ensure a more sustainable environment for future generations.

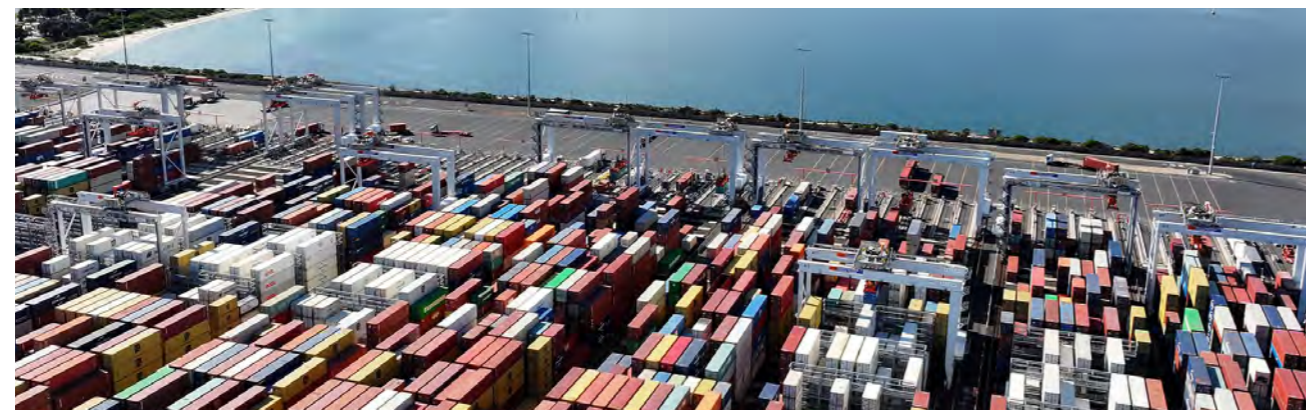
VICT REINFORCES COMMITMENT TO PROTECTING PORT PHILLIP BAY

Safeguarding the bay remains central to VICT's responsibility for its surrounding communities. The terminal has put in place systems to reduce harmful emissions and prevent contaminants from entering local waterways.

Stormwater catchment systems intercept pollutants before they reach the bay, ensuring they are managed and disposed of properly. To support this effort, VICT conducts real-time monitoring and regular National Association of Testing Authorities certified testing to help maintain safe water quality.

TECON SUAPE CITED FOR ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP



Tecon Suape S.A. (TSSA), International Container Terminal Services, Inc.'s (ICTSI) business unit in Pernambuco, Brazil, is once again recognized as one of the country's leading environmentally responsible port facilities after receiving the 2025 Ocean Friend seal. The award underscores the company's commitment to sustainability and ocean protection.

The award was presented at Suape Conecta, an event organized by the Suape Port Industrial Complex. It honors marine terminals that demonstrate excellence in environmental compliance and the consistently adopt best-in-class sustainable practices across port operations.

MICT-SDU SUSTAINS COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS THROUGH THE PAROLA INTER-AGENCY NETWORK

The Manila International Container Terminal (MICT) Sustainability and Development Unit (SDU) continued to support the initiatives of the Parola Inter-Agency Network (PIAN) in 2025, reinforcing collaboration among community organizations and partners working toward sustainable development in the Parola community.

PIAN's anniversary celebration brought together 58 leaders and staff from 12 member organizations. The milestone event served as a platform for strategic discussions, program alignment, and stakeholder engagement, highlighting innovation in community programming and strengthening inter-agency partnerships.

SDU also supported the PIAN Annual Capacity Building Training in Talisay, Batangas, where 44 participants engaged in a training to equip community leaders with adaptive leadership tools, systems thinking approaches, and collaborative strategies to address complex development challenges and design inclusive, community-driven interventions.

PIAN also advanced youth empowerment through a Mental Health Lecture and Self-Care Session on November 22 at the Puso sa Puso Edukasyon Inc. Parola Center. The activity gathered 15 youth leaders who participated in discussions on mental

health awareness, stress management, and healthy coping strategies, encouraging open dialogue and strengthening peer support within the community.

In support of safeguarding and inclusive development, SDU participated in the Training on the Prevention of Sexual Harassment, Abuse, and Exploitation (PSHEA) and Gender Transformative Programming organized by Plan International Pilipinas under the SUFASEC Project.

The year concluded with the PIAN Year-End Assessment on December 4-5 in Manila, where partners reviewed program outcomes, evaluated progress, and mapped future initiatives for the Parola community.

Through these initiatives, the MICT SDU reinforced its role as a key convener within the network, helping strengthen partnerships, build institutional capacity, and sustain integrated community development efforts in Parola.

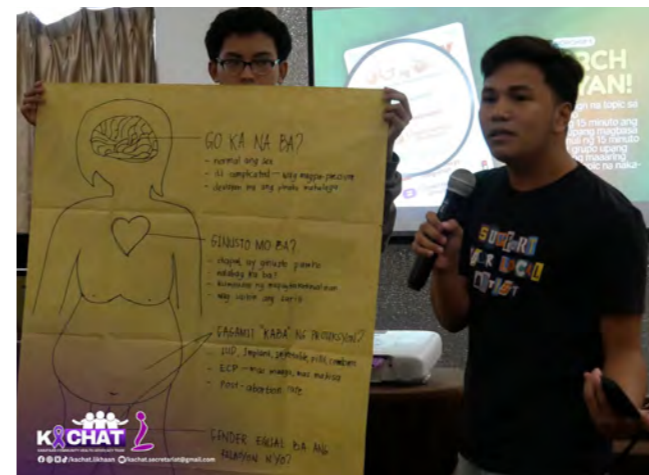


MICT-SDU ADVANCES SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH



MICT SDU implemented Project YAKAP (Youth's Attitude, Knowledge, and Participation Towards Empowerment) in partnership with Likhaan Center for Women's Health, to train 15 youth peer promoters from Barangays 20 and 275 in Tondo, Manila, equipping them with communication skills, SRH knowledge, and peer facilitation techniques. These youth leaders became frontline advocates, providing accurate and youth-friendly information to their peers and community. Through peer-led discussions, outreach sessions, and the distribution of 100 Safe Sex Kits with educational materials, the project improved access to SRH resources while reducing stigma. Regular monitoring ensured active participation and reinforced knowledge retention among youth participants.

Also in partnership with Likhaan Center for Women's Health, MICT-SDU expanded access to long-term contraceptive methods for women in Parola through the "Her Future, Her Choice". A total of 92 women received contraceptive implants to address the need for family planning in underserved communities and strengthen reproductive autonomy among women.



MICT-SDU SUSTAINS "BATANG PAROLA, BATANG MASIGLA" PROGRAM



MICT-SDU, in collaboration with the Center for Community Transformation (CCT) and Manila Health Department, sustained the community-based targeted



supplemental feeding and nutrition education program titled "Batang Parola, Batang Masigla".

The program supported 128 undernourished children aged 3–5 years through a 90-day feeding intervention, addressing both immediate nutritional needs and promoting long-term health improvements. Daily nutritious meals were provided, complemented by weekly growth monitoring and health assessments, with baseline and follow-up weight measurements systematically recorded.

MICT-SDU SUPPORTS TB PREVENTION IN PAROLA

ICTSI, through its Sustainability and Development initiatives, supported the TODA Community Engagement for Tuberculosis (TB) Prevention Project in Parola Compound, by providing resources to support community outreach and TB screening activities.

Through sustained community engagement and strategic partnerships with Culion Foundation, Inc. and CCT-Visions of Hope Foundation, the project contributed to increasing TB awareness, encouraged preventive treatment, and reduced transmission risks within households in Parola.

MICT-SDU HOLDS 2025 INTEGRATED MEDICAL MISSION



MICT-SDU reinforced ICTSI's commitment to providing accessible and holistic healthcare services in its host community through the conduct of the 2025 Integrated Medical Mission which provided medical consultations, optical services, dental services, vaccination, therapeutic massages, and reproductive health services to 688 patients from the Parola community.



MICT-SDU ADVANCE ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT IN PAROLA



MICT-SDU supported livelihood and economic empowerment initiatives aimed at strengthening income opportunities and financial inclusion in the Parola community.

Skills training and start-up support equipped residents with competencies to enhance employability and

facilitate small-scale livelihood activities. A Basic Housekeeping Training benefited 20 participants through hands-on instruction and competency assessments, while Barista Training provided 10 participants with practical skills in coffee preparation, customer service, and small café operations.

SDU also pushed for social protection and financial inclusion by supporting the Philippine Department of Social Welfare and Development's *Serbisyo Caravan*. The activity served 525 Parola residents and facilitated membership registration and service access through partner financial institutions.



MMT, ICTSI FOUNDATION BRING FESTIVE CHEER TO TONDO'S PARADISE HEIGHTS

The Manila Multipurpose Terminal partnered with the ICTSI Foundation to donate sacks of rice to Paradise Heights Community in Balut, Tondo, Manila, on April 20, supporting the annual feast of the barangay that is part of MMT's hinterland.

MMT ORGANIZES BLOOD DRIVES WITH PHILIPPINE RED CROSS

Manila Multipurpose Terminal (MMT), in partnership with the Philippine Red Cross, conducted blood donation drives as part of its employee volunteerism and wellness initiatives. Organized by the Human Resources Department's Health and Wellness Section and held at the terminal operations building, the activities brought together company officers and staff in support of life-saving efforts for patients in need of blood.

Across the two bloodletting activities conducted during the year, a total of 63 employee donors contributed 28.35 liters (28,350 cubic centimeters) of blood.

Through these initiatives, MMT continued to promote volunteerism among employees while supporting the Philippine Red Cross in sustaining the country's blood supply.

EJMT CELEBRATES RAMADAN WITH LOCAL COMMUNITY

East Java Multipurpose Terminal (EJMT), in cooperation with Lamongan Shorebase, held several events for the local community of Kemantren in Lamongan Regency during the holy month of Ramadan.

Aligned with the theme "Celebrating Blessing through Togetherness," the first event held in March 19 provided 1,752 food packages for every household in the local Kemantren Village. More than 1,100 kilograms of dates were also delivered to the local mosques for sharing during the Buka Puasa or breaking of the fast throughout the Ramadan period. On March 26, EJMT celebrated the Buka Puasa with a local orphanage from the Kemantren Village.

The events allowed EJMT representatives and local community leaders to come together during the holy month and share positive messages about the spirit of unity and the importance of togetherness.

MGT HOSTS FIRST MINI-MARATHON IN MATADI

Matadi Gateway Terminal (MGT) made history with the successful staging of the MGT Marathon 2025, the first major sporting event in Kongo Central and the city of Matadi.

The inaugural event gathered more than 500 runners comprising MGT employees and local residents, drawing thousands of supporters who created a lively atmosphere from start to finish. Participants competed in 12-kilometer and 21-kilometer courses, testing their endurance while promoting solidarity, perseverance, and community spirit.
